### Shaping the Future of Elderly Care: Lessons from the CARES Project in Southern Denmark



On November 13-14, 2024, the Region of Southern Denmark hosted European partners and local stakeholders of the CARES project, focusing on remote healthcare solutions for the elderly. The two-day event facilitated the exchange of experiences and showcased innovative eHealth practices aimed at enhancing senior care.

### Day One: Regional eHealth Strategies and Best Practices

The event commenced with an overview of the Region of Southern Denmark by Anja Lund, followed by insights into the region's digitization efforts presented by Kurt Espersen. Anne Friis Hansen discussed public-private collaborations and the "One Entry" initiative, highlighting the region's approach to healthcare innovation.

Partners from Poland, France, Sweden, and Spain shared their experiences, leading into presentations of regional best practices, including:

- The Geriatric Patient & Cross-Sectoral Collaboration: Presented by Karen A. Ranberg, this initiative emphasizes coordinated care for elderly patients across various sectors.
- **GERI Toolbox v. 2.0**: A telemedicine solution for elderly care, introduced by Alexander Eriksen, designed to enhance remote monitoring and support.
- **PATINA (Prevention of Acute Admission)**: A decision-support tool aimed at monitoring older adults at risk of hospitalization, presented by Anders Fournaise.

The day concluded with a visit to the New University Hospital in Odense, where participants observed practical applications of eHealth innovations.

**Day Two: Telemedicine and Collaborative Initiatives** 

The second day featured additional presentations on regional best practices:

- **TeleCOPD**: A telemedicine program for patients with chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, discussed by Kuno JS Kudajewski.
- **DataDonor**: An initiative enabling citizens to contribute personal health data for public research, presented by Christian Mercado.
- **DELIVER**: A project focused on enhancing digital competencies among healthcare professionals, introduced by Linda Justi.

Partners from Croatia and Poland also shared their insights into healthcare innovation and collaborative approaches.

The event concluded with a cultural visit to the H.C. Andersen Museum and a meeting of the Project Coordination Team. This study visit fostered meaningful discussions on telemedicine, data-driven healthcare, and cross-sector collaboration, underscoring the region's dedication to improving health outcomes for the elderly through digital innovation.

## eHealth for Senior Care: Improving Access at Home and in Rural Areas - 2nd Tutoring Session



On January 22, 2025, the CARES project hosted an online workshop focused on how eHealth solutions can improve healthcare access and well-being for seniors living at home and in rural or underserved areas. The event attracted numerous participants, including project partners and local stakeholders, all eager to explore practical approaches to implementing public health policies.

### **Key Insights and Discussions**

The workshop opened with a broad discussion on the challenges and opportunities of using digital health solutions to support elderly care outside traditional medical facilities. Participants agreed that eHealth plays a crucial role in bridging healthcare gaps, especially in regions where access to medical services is limited.

Presentations showcased various regional strategies demonstrating how eHealth tools can enhance care delivery, reduce hospital admissions, and support independent living among seniors. From telemedicine services to data-driven care models, the examples highlighted how digital innovations can effectively respond to the needs of aging populations.

### **Collaborative Learning and Shared Experiences**

The interactive format of the workshop allowed participants to engage in open discussions, exchanging knowledge and best practices. These conversations revealed that, despite regional differences, many areas face similar challenges, including limited healthcare resources and fragmented digital infrastructures.

A recurring theme was the importance of tailoring eHealth solutions to the specific needs of elderly users. Participants emphasized that involving caregivers and healthcare professionals in the design and implementation of digital tools is essential for ensuring their practicality and widespread adoption.

#### **Key Takeaways**

The workshop underscored the need for a holistic approach to eHealth, combining technological advancements with social and organizational considerations. Long-term, flexible planning emerged as a critical factor in successfully integrating eHealth solutions into healthcare systems.

Additionally, strengthening digital competencies among healthcare workers and fostering cross-sector collaboration were identified as essential components for overcoming barriers in healthcare delivery, especially in rural areas.

Overall, the workshop was well-received, with participants expressing optimism about the potential of eHealth to transform elderly care. The discussions highlighted a shared

commitment to developing inclusive, user-friendly digital health solutions that can improve the quality of life for seniors, regardless of where they live.

Highlighted below are some of the notable practices featured on the CARES platform:

Personal Recovery Plans (PRP) in Community Resources for Severe Mental
 Disorders (SMD): This initiative introduces a collaborative integrated care platform
 that combines healthcare and social services. Managed through Electronic Health
 Records (EHR), it ensures continuous support for individuals with severe mental
 disorders, promoting their social and economic inclusion.

- Teleictus Aragón Interconsultation Videoconference Platform: Addressing the
  challenges of providing timely stroke care in remote areas, this telemedicine service
  enables real-time consultations and rapid initiation of reperfusion therapy, ensuring
  patients receive critical care within standard guideline times.
- GRYDSEN A Tool for Preventing Cognitive Decline Through VR Cognitive-Motor
  Training: Embracing cutting-edge technology, GRYDSEN offers an innovative virtual
  reality system designed to support seniors' cognitive and motor functions. By
  enhancing coordination and mental fitness, it significantly improves the quality of life
  for the elderly.

These examples underscore the transformative impact of sharing and implementing good practices across regions. By leveraging the insights and successes of others, regions can tailor and adopt strategies that address their unique challenges, leading to improved public services and policy outcomes.

## Roadmap as a Key Tool for Improving Policy Instruments in the CARES Project



In international projects such as CARES, improving policy instruments in partner regions is a crucial part of the activities. One of the tools that enables effective planning and implementation of such improvements is the Roadmap Template (RM). This practical tool translates acquired knowledge and experience exchange into concrete actions tailored to local needs.

### What is a Roadmap in the CARES Project?

The roadmap within the CARES project is a document that identifies the scope and plan for implementing actions aimed at improving the policy instrument (PI) in partner regions. Created based on mutual learning processes, analysis of good practices (GPs), study visits (SVs), and technical support (TSs), it becomes a tangible step towards implementing real changes in regional policies.

### Why is the Roadmap so Important?

The roadmap is not only an action plan – it also serves as a space for reflection on what changes are needed and how to implement them effectively. Thanks to it, each CARES project partner can adapt solutions to local needs while drawing on the experiences of other European regions.

### **Key Elements of the Roadmap in the CARES Project**

When developing the roadmap, it is essential to address the following questions:

- Engaging Decision Makers How does the partner plan to engage decision-makers
  to achieve the expected improvement of the policy instrument? Identifying effective
  methods of collaboration with decision-makers is key to ensuring the sustainability of
  implemented changes.
- 2. **Cooperation with Stakeholders** How does the partner plan to involve key stakeholders in the process of improving the policy instrument? Active participation of stakeholders increases the effectiveness of actions and their social acceptance.

- 3. **Utilizing Good Practices** Which good practices and experiences from other regions are planned to be used to improve the policy instrument? Analyzing proven solutions helps avoid mistakes and shortens the time needed for implementation.
- 4. **Impact on the Target Group** How will the planned improvements to the instrument affect the project's target group? Assessing the impact is crucial to ensuring that changes bring the expected benefits.
- 5. **Timeline for Implementation** What is the timeline for implementation, covering the stages of planning, execution, and monitoring? A clear schedule allows for effective process management and progress tracking.


### The Roadmap as an Open Document
